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Course Description

In 10LC2, we will build upon those skills attained in 10LC1. We will continue to address many genres of literature and focus on their thematic implications. We will also continue to prepare for the reading and writing tasks included in both the ACT and the Core Curricular Assessments. Students must be able to read critically, make thematic connections, and, finally, write cohesively about many topics using multiple sources. A researched, persuasive paper as well as a synthesis essay will be assigned this semester. Students will continue to study advanced vocabulary, sentence variety, logical organization, and the purpose and tools of writers. The study of grammar, usage, and mechanics will be integrated throughout the semester. Students will improve their understanding and mastery of standard written language and use that knowledge to competently produce more developed prose.

Classroom Policies

<u>Reading Assignments:</u> You will be responsible for reading a wide selection of material. Be prepared to discuss the readings on the assigned days, **and be ready for content quizzes at any time**. **Summer Reading** will be addressed throughout the term.

<u>Writing Assignments:</u> Assignments will vary in scope from short responses to essays of several pages. These assignments **must** be **typed** (MLA style) and free from spelling/grammatical/mechanical errors. If you have an issue with your computer/printer, notify me IMMEDIATELY via email or see me before school starts. **You will not be allowed to print during class.**

<u>Plagiarism</u> will result in a zero on the assignment and a referral to the administration. Some of our class papers will be submitted to <u>www.turnitin.com</u> to confirm authenticity. Please keep hard copies of drafts to show your writing process.

<u>Notebook:</u> We will use a Composition Notebook TM for informal writing, reflection and analysis. This notebook must be kept organized and turned in as announced. It will be graded periodically.

<u>Late Work:</u> All course work is expected to be turned in **on time**. In the event of an **excused absence**, you may make up the work assigned and turn it in according to the school policy. **Unexcused absences** do not allow for make-up work. **No late work will be accepted without an extension pass.** You will receive three passes to use throughout the semester and extend the due date of the assignment by one week.

<u>Vocabulary</u>: We will study both Literary Terminology and Contextual Words from the assigned literature. Tests will be given that will include the words as well as any grammar, usage, mechanics material we have covered during that period.

Final Exam: A final exam will be given. It will count for 20% of your grade.

Attendance: It is your responsibility to find out what you missed, as well as the due dates. Please refer to my website (see below). If a test is missed due to an excused absence, you must arrange to make up the test before or after school. When you know you are going to miss class for any reason, it is your responsibility to do the assigned work and return to class prepared to hand in your assignment and take any quizzes or tests that are given.
